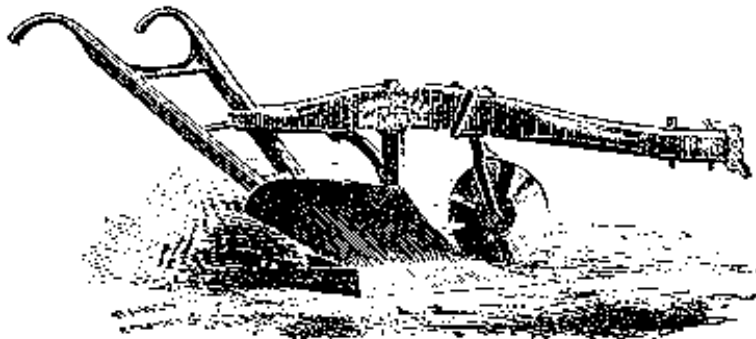
With My Hand on the Plow: Servant-hood, Formation & Renewal

This edition of the Bells comes to you just as we have completed our celebration of the "Birthday of the Church"-- Pentecost. When we gathered the whole community at the one service at 10 o'clock in the morning on May 31st, we did so to celebrate our common life together in the sure knowledge that there are "many gifts, but one Spirit." And it is the working practical knowledge of this that informs our Vestry's leadership in the three primary areas of focus in ministry for our church this year; servant-hood, formation and renewal.

Being a servant to others is an embracing of my own working definition of what it means to be a Christian. "Think of the other person before you think of yourself" is how you have heard me say it, many times in sermons and in conversation. My understanding of it comes from a time probably ten years ago when my then 14 or 15 year old son asked me how it was that Deborah and I had been together for so long...and the words just came out of my mouth. And when I heard them, I realized that the Lord had given me some wisdom to live by, which I have sought to give away the knowledge of ever since.

We need to be about the business of serving one another. It is how we will best care for one another, how we will continue to

grow our church, and how we best can embrace the Gospel message of Jesus. When we see other's working, pitch in. When you see something that needs attention, tend to it. If our folks are in hospital, visit them. Jesus says to us: *"I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father."* (John 15: 13 -14) Serving one another is an act of Christian friendship, and treating each other as friends brings honor to God our Father, and to God's son Jesus, who is our Master and our Teacher.



Formation is the life-long work of any committed Christian. What's the old line? "If you ain't growing, you're dying". If we want our lives as Christian people to be complete and fulfilling, then we need to be studying the scriptures, going to church and worshipping God, and seeking always to learn more about how we can best put our faith into action. This is why I called Trudy to come to St. Mary's as our Missioner for Christian Formation. Trudy knows more about Christian Formation than anybody I know in the church. And after 25 years of working in the church myself, and most of it in the field of Christian Formation, that is saying something.

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We have put together for the remainder of this year some remarkable offerings for folks of all ages here at St. Mary's. Because of our Vestry's commitment to these three primary areas of ministry for our parish, they have agreed to move the time of our principal worship service to 10:30 on Sunday mornings, so that all of us can have access to the time that we will be making these offerings. Please read through Trudy's article in this edition to get the details. What I want to say to you is that what we are offering is the very best stuff we have. It is new, it is the result of years of working in the field, it is carefully thought out, and it is intended to deepen our faith, offer new skills and approaches to ministry that will enliven our church and grow our community.

Renewal. It is such an important word. It is critical to our understanding of what it means to be a believer in Jesus Christ, and how it is that we can live that belief in our daily life. Renewal takes on many forms. For some of us we may find renewal in ancient practices such as Centering Prayer or Labyrinth meditation. For others it may be Cursillo. Still others find renewal in retreat away from the noise and pace of daily life, and entering into the spiritual discipline of engaging the Daily Office in monastic settings. But it is always about "re-charging" our batteries. I believe that opportunities for us to gather as a community also provide the opportunity for renewal. Events like the coming Luau in the Park...the Annual Parish Picnic on June 7th at Ken Adams Park is an opportunity for renewal. Renewal of your community is an essential part of feeling renewed. To gather together as one family, eat together, share a meal together, play some games with our kids, sing together, make Eucharist together... these are important reminders that we matter to one another, and that we matter to God.

Our recent service on Armed Forces day was another day that was tremendously renewing to our community. So many of you have made mention of what a great feeling was in church that day. How "right" it felt to lay hands on those of us who have served in the Armed Forces of our country, and how good it was to do that at church. That sense of the holy that somehow seems so elusive in a "normal" day was so evident on that Sunday...this feeling-- this hard-to-put-words-to-but-you-know-it-when-you-feel-it feeling...this too is renewal.

As we enter into our summer months, please know that the direction we are going is one of renewal, and formation and servant-hood ministry. Our offerings of Vacation Bible School, our Sunday morning Christian Formation hour, our Annual Parish Picnic, everything we do will be with this guiding focus in mind. I am not so concerned with growing our church into thousands of people who can't get enough (although I would certainly LOVE it that if that is the Lord's will for us!) so much as I am concerned that we treat our church as what it is: Christ's Body in the world. And when we keep that fixed in our hearts, that the Church is Christ's Body in the world, we will be just fine. Because we will be caring for our community as we would care for Jesus. And in doing that, we will grow our church, and we will care for our people, and we will continue to reach out to the everlasting arms that hold us, and encourage us, and send us ever forward in ministry. And that is exciting, and renewing, and it forms us as strong in our faith and bold in our actions. And that is what being church is all about.

The New Education Hour

On Sunday, June 14 at 9:15 AM, St. Mary's will begin our new education hour. We foresee many benefits to this shift. We believe ongoing life-long Christian formation is the right and responsibility of all church members. We cannot be good evangelists and spread the Good News when we don't fully know it or understand it ourselves. We certainly won't be able to pass the faith on to our children if we are unsure ourselves. Creating this education hour

enables more parishioners to participate. Many of our older members don't drive at night. People can have the option of attending either service and still be able to attend classes. Parents will have something meaningful to do while their children are in Sunday School. The children will be able to participate fully in worship, and our acolytes won't have to miss class.

Summer Sunday School will begin its video series, and the J2A group will continue to meet in Dave's room. Our first adult classes will be presented by our Stephen's Ministers, who have made themselves knowledgeable in all aspects of elder care. In August, I will offer several weeks of training on leading small adult study groups. In September, I will present a few weeks of different methods of Bible study. The plan is to have a solid, well trained corps of Adult Study Leaders. The leaders will be able to choose from a large array of resources, books, study guides, lesson plans and series, and DVDs. Our church will build up an up-to-date teaching collection from such respected sources such as The Thoughtful Christian, Leader Resources, and Church Publishing.

Come this fall, we will have a series of Sunday Morning Learning Circles in place. People can move freely in or out of the different circles, as their interest dictates. The circles will be of varying durations, usually lasting anywhere from one to six weeks. When we are in full swing, you can expect the following types of circles to always be available:

- + Children's Godly Play and All things New
- + Rite 13 and J2A
- + Bible Study—different types
- + A parenting Group led by Trudy
- + Short Term Topical Studies on the church in the world.

This system will allow us to be responsive to new developments and issues, as well as to the needs of newcomers. Your ongoing input and participation will allow us all to grow together, and will make this a success.

Help Wanted: The Story Keepers

Some of you may be old enough to remember the excitement of Saturday matinee serials at your local movie theater. These cliffhangers made you eager to return each week to find out what happened to your favorite heroes and heroines. This year for Summer Sunday School we will be following the adventures of *The Story Keepers*, a thirteen part video series. The story follows the trials and triumphs of a baker named Ben and his family. The story is set in the Rome of AD 64 when Nero is persecuting Christians. Often on the run and in danger, the family recalls the parables and teachings of Jesus to help them maintain their courage and faith.

We will need thirteen volunteer "Story Keepers" to manage Summer Sunday School. Sign up sheets will be available in the narthex on Sundays, and in the church office during the week. Responsibilities include bringing a snack, showing the video segment, leading a dis-

cussion about the video, or doing a related activity in response to the segment shown. Leader guide sheets will be available for each week, and will be kept in folders in a box at the church office. Each episode is a half hour. Our Sunday morning Education Hour is from 9:15 to 10:15. The typical sequence is:

- + Experience the story {watch the video}
- + Engage the story {participate in a simple activity}
- + Embody the story {the children tell what they watched in their own words}
- + And if time permits, you may expand the story using supplemental ideas.

We are all required to be story keepers, for that is how our faith is passed on from generation to generation. Before we ever learn theology we learn stories. We start to own our faith when the stories become our story. Help us engage our next generation at St. Mary's by volunteering to be a "story keeper" this summer.

EFM Classes To Begin This Fall

We are going to try again to put together a group for Education For Ministry (EFM). EFM is a distance learning theological program of the School of Theology of the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee. Participants commit one year at a time to meet weekly in seminars lead by a trained mentor. Completion of the program takes four years, during which participants study the Bible, church history, and twentieth century theology. EFM provides a comprehensive, experiential education in the foundations and message of our Christian faith. Through a commitment to an ongoing small group process, group members learn how to do theological reflection and to identify the ministry they were called to through their Baptism.

We need a minimum of six and a maximum of twelve to make a viable group. Classes will begin on September 16. They will be held on Wednesday evenings from 6:00 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. Since LA. is a sponsoring diocese, the cost per year is \$340.00. If you need financial assistance you may speak to Fr. Michael about available scholarships. Trudy has the registration forms and some prospectuses. You can also read more about EFM on line. **All registration forms and checks must be in by June 30** so that we can receive our books in time for September.

HOW ARE WE DOING??????????

In these times of trial and tribulation, the title question is a very interesting one. The economy has taken a nose dive, something both Democrats and Republicans agree on, something you never thought would happen.

I for one was very concerned about my business this year, as I was planning on semi-retiring next year when I am eligible for full Social Security. Peg and I are working very hard to reduce our debt, so that we could have Social Security pay our fixed obligations, and work small jobs to support some travel. But then the bottom fell out, and I did not know if we would have any work, much less enough to pay off our debt.

What does this have to do with St. Mary's? St. Mary's is a lot like my business, it is dependant upon the generosity of others to survive. Let us look at some figures (*page 10*).

We are at a monthly expense rate of \$3,313.00 more then income. Income is \$1,779.00 below our projected income for the first four months of 2009. If this trend continues we will, for the second consecutive year, end with a deficit. This does not mean we have a debt; St. Mary's is blessed to have cash reserves to make up a deficit, but it is not a bottomless pit. As we speak, your vestry is working on ways to shore up the reserves by increasing our interest income which is a difficult task when interest rates are at the 0.5% level.

Your Vestry is working to reduce the spending, but we, the congregation, are the only ones who can increase the income. The numbers I gave above are through April, and summer is just around the corner. This a time when income historically goes down with parishioners on vacations, sports keeping us busy on weekends, etc. I know we all have good intentions to make up our short falls in the fall, and most of us do! But if we are already behind in our giving, can we really make up 6 or 7 months in 5 or 6 months?

My business has increased; Peg and I are on back on our planned track. When I saw an increase in business, I made a decision to double my giving, so as to help make up for those in our congregation who can not give as they want. I ask each one of you to reevaluate where you are, and how you can increase your giving, to give us a positive balance at year's end.

As I write this I have received a phone call from my customer, telling me she has been evacuated from her home because of the Jesusita fire. Another stumbling block in my plans as I have hundreds of dollars of equipment at the house, which may be lost, and what about the time I have spent there, who pays that? I know in the end it will work out; it is just aggravating...but it will not stop us.

Just as the economy should not stop you.
