it, let's remember a few things:

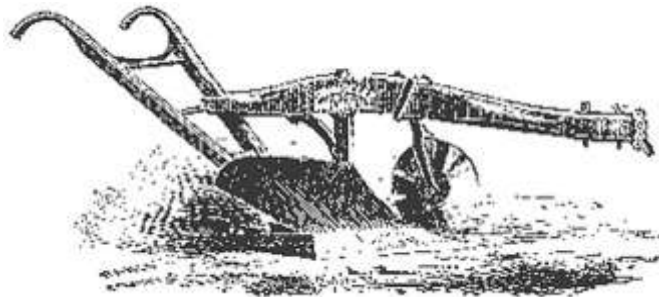
We live by grace. What is Grace? Grace is God's love in action. Grace is everything we are and have been given, even though we have done nothing to deserve the gift that God has given us.

Christian Formation

Guiding Lights

Our culture doesn't pay too much attention to Epiphany. Fortunately, the church is wiser. Epiphany is a great season to combat the post Christmas let down, with its exhaustion, debt, weight gain and other guilts. Epiphany is a season of celebrations, light, gifts, music and renewed purpose, all without the perceived pressure of Christmas.

The name Epiphany comes from the Greek word "Epiphania", which means to show, make known or reveal. The

feast day is observed on January 6. The Epiphany season reminds us of the three miracles that manifest the divinity of Christ. The celebration originated in the Eastern Church in AD 361, beginning as a commemoration of the birth of Jesus. Later additional meanings were added – the visit

of the three Magi, Christ's baptism in the Jordan River, and his first miracle at the wedding in Cana. These three events are central to the meaning of Epiphany. They are all of a public nature, emphasizing the idea that God comes to all people. The light shines in the darkness so that all might see and come to know and be encouraged by the hope that is Christ.

I wonder if the Magi lived today, if they would even be able to see that Christmas star, in the midst of our overly lit cities that often obliterate the full splendor of the night sky. In my spiritual journey I am often at a loss for guideposts and direction. I long for a clear sign or signal of God's direction for my life. I know as Christians we

are all responsible for showing forth the light of God's love in the world. The Wise men brought gifts of great portent and meaning to the Christ child. We too are called upon to bring forth our gifts.

Epiphany is the perfect season to dig in to our spiritual treasure chests to see what gifts and

tools our Lord has endowed each of us with. Unwrapping these gifts takes prayer, self scrutiny and honesty. The value of these gifts can only be measured in their purposefulness and our commitment to take God's message out into the world. To be beacons of light in the dark, forsaken

places is our call this Epiphany. Discovering our gifts is not for bragging rights, self aggrandizement, or even choice assignments to serve only our own congregation. To take the light of Christ into the world requires boldness and confidence, imagination and commitment, courage and sacrifice, prayer and perspiration, empathy and perseverance, and an ability and desire to see beyond the needs of our own small circles.

This Epiphany season our Sunday Morning Learning Circles will offer us the opportunity to discover and explore our spiritual gifts. Our three part series will be grounded in scripture, particularly the work of St. Paul. Personal inventories will be looked at for their translation into concrete ministries. God willing, this will give us all renewed vigor for recommitting ourselves to a comprehensive Ministry Fair at the start of Lent. Check the Learning Circles Schedule.
